INTRODUCTION

There are more people in slavery than at any other point in history. In fact, 25 million men, women and children are held in forced labour slavery alone, and it affects all of us.

From the smartphone in your pocket to the food in your cupboard and the clothes you are wearing, many of the products we rely on every single day have a high risk of being made by men, women and children who are being held in slavery or are being exploited. Every day, we consume products made by people who are forced to work long hours without pay and basic rights, whilst facing daily abuse.

But it doesn't have to be this way.

Slavery is a brutal and complex problem but, at IJM, we know we can be part of the solution to stop slavery at source.

This resource also includes some short Bible studies which you can do alone or as part of a small group. Feel free to focus on the bits you find most helpful – you may want to spend time digging deeply into a single verse or question or you may want to reflect on everything available. However you choose to engage, we hope and pray you meet Jesus as you journey through it.

The next 40 days could change your habits and change the world.

THE BITTER TRUTH BEHIND COFFEE

"But you, God, see the trouble of the afflicted; you consider their grief and take it in hand. The victims commit themselves to you; you are the helper of the fatherless. " - PSALM 10:14 (NIV)

More than two billion cups of coffee are drunk worldwide every day. In the UK, on average we each drink around two cups of coffee per day. Yet it's grown almost exclusively in the Global South.

No one should be enslaved or exploited to produce the coffee we drink.

CLOSING PRAYER:

Consider what you have learnt today about slavery in the coffee industry and take some time to pray about it. To close, read Psalm 10:12-15 as a prayer:

Arise, Lord! Lift up your hand, O God. Do not forget the helpless. Why does the wicked man revile God? Why does he say to himself, "He won't call me to account"? But you, God, see the trouble of the afflicted; you consider their grief and take it in hand. The victims commit themselves to you; you are the helper of the fatherless. Break the arm of the wicked man; call the evildoer to account for his wickedness that would not otherwise be found out.

THE FISHY SEAFOOD BUSINESS

"Religion that God our Father accepts as pure and faultless is this: to look after orphans and widows in their distress and to keep oneself from being polluted by the world." - JAMES 1:27 (NIV)

Fish is one of the key industries that has a high risk of slavery in its supply chains. Thailand is one of the world's largest seafood exporters and the world's leading exporter of shrimp. A 2017 survey by Issara and IJM found that 76% of migrant workers in the Thai fishing industry had been held in debt bondage. Victims describe illness, physical injury, psychological and sexual abuse, and even the murder of crewmates. People can be held on board vessels working in remote locations at sea for months or even years at a time. Since 2016, IJM has been working to combat slavery and trafficking in the Thai fishing industry.

LOOKING AT FASHION'S TRUE COST

Modern slavery is quite literally woven into the fabric of our everyday lives. Sadly, the clothing industry is one of the biggest drivers of modern slavery and exploitation across the globe. Right now, women, men and children are being exploited to produce what we wear. IJM is continuing to work with survivors and police to find and free victims of bonded labour and forced labour even during the pandemic.

THE DARKER SIDE OF CHOCOLATE
